

The Standard Hotel was built in 1868 with additions and alterations over the years, including a new façade in the 1920s.

(As you arrive, take a look at the building next door. It's an example of one of the first factory conversions in Fitzroy. The huge red brick building now divided into two stylish apartments with a large central courtyard was originally a shoe factory.)

#### October's activity

Was it a demonstration, a rally or a protest? Nothing of the sort, though local residents must indeed have been wondering as 100 people took to Fitzroy's streets on Sunday 11 October under the guidance of Margot Huxley from RMIT to learn more about Fitzroy's history of urban development.

We saw one of the first flats in Fitzroy, the 1930s heritage-listed *Cairo* in King William Street, looking dark and mysterious behind tall trees. We then contrasted rows of workers terraces from the 19th century with examples of units from the first wave of gentrification in the 1960s and 1970s.

Then it was on to the former MacRobertson's confectionary factory in Kerr and Argyle Streets. Many of the buildings have now been converted to apartments. Our group was lucky to be invited to inspect one conversion and we thank Mr and Mrs Hunter for their generous offer.

A quirky touch by the architects in this complex is the planting in the common space of coconut palms and cherry trees (commemorating MacRobertson's famous cherry ripe chocolates), and the patterning of the courtyard bricks in the MacRobertson tartan (a tribute to the building's origins).

#### We are not amused...

So reads the plaque on the solid grey pedestal in the middle of a garden bed in the Edinburgh Gardens. As reported in the October newsletter, plaques have been fixed to a number of sites in the garden. This one tells us that a statue of Queen Victoria, presented to the people of Fitzroy in 1901 by George Godfrey MLC, once adorned the pedestal. Some stories say it fell and was damaged, others say it mysteriously disappeared. Whichever is correct, the statue is no longer with us. The plaque includes a 1907 photograph of the statue. The original photo is in the Mead Album in the La Trobe Collection, State Library of Victoria.

#### What's in a name?

Street names fascinate me. While most names stay the same, some are changed by events or circumstances. For example, some names are changed to commemorate worthy local citizens. The following origins are taken from Suzanne Dance's appendix in the book Fitzroy, Melbourne's First Suburb.

after Brunswick Street: Named Captain Brunswick Smythe who owned one of the first subdivisions. Gertrude Street: Named after the Captain's daughter Smith Street: Named for J. T. Smith, a hotelier, theatre-owner, Mayor of Melbourne and a Fitzroy alderman. (Previously called Eastern Road) Scotchmer Street: Named for W. Scotchmer, a real estate agent and a Fitzroy councillor 1867-1870 Westgarth Street: Named for William Westgarth, a member for Melbourne in the first Legislative Council. (Previously called New Street) Alfred Crescent: Named after Queen Victoria's son, Alfred, Duke of Edinburgh

#### Catholic celebrations

This year is the 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Fitzroy's All Saints Catholic Church. Sixty years ago, the church purchased the former Methodist Sunday School in King William Street and founded a chapel of ease. In 1959 it became All Saints parish church.
