Helen Macpherson Smith

Osborne House at 40 Nicholson St. was the girlhood home of Helen Macpherson Smith, who lived most of her life in Europe and left a philanthropic bequest for the people of Victoria.

At our last FHS function on 5 March, 34 members joined our evening walk which was followed by a meal at the Pumphouse Hotel. But first we gathered at the heights of Nauru House where Darvell Hutchinson told us of Helen's life, her forebears, her very generous bequest, and some of the many grants given to Victorian recipients.

Guests for the evening were Jim Davidson, Sue Dance and Peter Lovell who, 24 years earlier, had worked to save Osborne House when it was under threat of demolition.

In the 1852-1880 era, Helen's father, Robert Smith and his brothers, had a very successful timber yard in East Melbourne, between the ICI building and the Eastern Hill Fire Station. We walked through the site, with the timber theme well presented by the timber trucks then protesting at Parliament House.



WAS THEIR LABOUR IN VAIN? FITZROY'S FEMALE PUBLICANS

A talk by Clare Wright

Clare Wright was a recipient of the 2002 inaugural Geoffrey Serle Award for the best contribution to Australian history in a postgraduate thesis. Clare's PhD thesis, 'Beyond the Ladies Lounge', a history of female publicans in Victoria, 1875-1945, debunks the myth of the Australian pub as a male domain by documenting the role that women have traditionally played as hotel licensees. Clare is now Executive Officer of the History Council of Victoria, working to promote history in schools and the community.
