Local History Forum

The Local History Forum is an association of community-based history societies in the municipalities of Yarra and Melbourne, together with representatives from state organisations including the State Library of Victoria and the Royal Historical Society of Victoria.

The forum has been very active this year. A major initiative has been the proposal for the appointment of a funded local field historian to coordinate the identification of material within the municipalities. The proposal will shortly be submitted to the funding body.

The forum is also helping to coordinate a joint event for next year's Heritage Week. Societies will be developing displays for the theme: Beyond the Big Smoke.

Leisure in Fitzroy in the 1850s

In November 1840 the Travellers' Rest Hotel, a straggling weatherboard structure of four or five rooms, was situated in Nicholson Street, facing Faraday Street. The Travellers' Rest was for many years a popular refreshment stall for people indulging in strolls out of town, and it had, as an annual fixture, a billy-goat race with competitors dressed in jockey uniform.

Edmund Finn's Chronicles of early Melbourne, 1835-1852. (on page 762) records that for Boxing Day 1851:

'Henry Conway at Travellers' Rest invites all lovers of fun and frolic to a

GOAT RACE, with eight thoroughbred billygoats ridden by boys over half mile course with hurdle leaps, Newmarket style;

CLIMBING THE GREASY POLE, prize a Silver Watch;

TWO HUNDRED PIGEONS will be shot at;

THE RAT HUNT follows, in which three hundred trained rats will figure;

THE PIG WITH THE GREASY TALE and many other OLD ENGLISH GAMES will wind up the day.'

Editor's note: I'm not nostalgic for the 'old days' but I would dearly love to have been there and witnessed the rat hunt!!!!


