DEATH OF MR JAMES LINACRE. - The Argus announces the death of this gentleman, who as our readers will remember, was the contractor for the building of the Beechworth Lunatic Asylum. He, more than even Mr Simmie, who built the Beechworth Gaol, showed how work could be got through by kindness, firmness and justice to his employes. Mr Linaere's work also at the Beechworth Asylum had occasion to be put to the proof from its very foundation through the extraordinary " scamping" which was done in the building of the Kew Asylum at the same time. The foundations of the Beechworth Asylum were then laid, and awing to the discoveries which were made at Kew, the foundations here were born up and tried without mercy. But there was here an admirable inspector of works in the person of Mr Piekersgill, who not only thoroughly knows his business, but insists, without offence, on works being carried out to the letter. We have seen walls of the asylum, where alterations were necessary, knocked through in a great gap that a coach could drive through without the inspector thinking it necessary to put in a single prop -simply because he knew he was dealing | with real bricks and mortar. Mr James Linacre arrived in Melbourne in 1844, having been brought up a builder. He soon started contracting, and early in 1844, in partnership with Mr Wm, Kennon and John Hughes, undertook the building of the gaol and court-house at Portland. Their next undertaking of any magnitude was the completion of Prince's-bridge, from the key-stone upward, and also the Williamstown lighthouse and St. Paul's Church, Swanston-street, Meibourne. The partner-ship broke in 1852, when the diggings were in full swing. Mr Linacre then started contracting by himself, and was very successful. In connexion with his brother, Mr Abraham Linacre, he constructed the south wing of the Melbourne Public Library, Melbourne Club, and several other large buildings. For the last few years Mr Linacre has not been able to undertake any heavy contracts on account of failing health, being troubled with chronic asthma, to which he finally succumbed on the 14th instant. Mr Linacre was never inclined to public or political life, but as a private citizen he was much esteemed by all with whom he came in contact. He leaves a widow and grown-up family well provided for."
